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## First Down with Fr. Eric5 0 40 30 20 10



Dear Friends,

The thing about illness is that it never makes an appointment; it simply appears in our lives. That is why we have a powerful sacrament called the anointing of the sick. This sacrament is meant for anyone who is ill and needs and desires healing. The root of this anointing of the sick comes from the book of James in the New Testament. It states that if anyone is sick among you, they are to call for a priest and they are to be anointed with oil. The prayer of faith will save the sick person, and the Lord will raise them up.

Catholics, at times, can be slow to update their faith. For many, what is understood about anointing is "last rites," and so they never invite the priest to come and anoint them for healing, only thinking that those close to death should ever consider asking for the anointing.

A central part of Catholic teaching is the power of healing, and there are many types of healing. There is a physical healing that we can see and desire. There is mental and emotional healing. And the scriptures speak of spiritual healing most often.

The blessing of the anointing of the sick is that I can literally see the body change right in front of my eyes when the anointing is given. Maybe it is less fear, more at peace, feeling more courageous, moving from anxiety to patience.

So, how does one go about requesting this sacrament? One can call the office to speak to the priest to make an appointment. Depending on one's location, the priest can visit the home or health facility. Priests work together to anoint people, so if one lives closer to another parish and the closest priest can be there in a timely manner, then the person can be open to having another priest offer the sacrament. We are all on the same team, so remember to let the priest work and support each other, as there are times when the demands of the day might require another priest to help out. I know I do that for people in our area as well. Another way is any time after Mass, one can request the anointing of the sick. The priest will gladly anoint the person, and many times they bring family and friends to pray with them as they receive this sacrament.

I hope this helps people feel free to ask for this sacrament when illness comes into their lives. Any illness is important to receive prayers and anointing. Please do not assume your illness might not be seen as important enough to be blessed for healing.

My friends, this is a great sacrament. Please know it is available to anyone who desires healing.

# Spirituality and Mental Health

The month of May marks Mental Health Awareness month. Our mental health is an intrinsic part of who we are and how God created us. We are created in the image and likeness of God and so we must be reminded of the innate human dignity we are created with despite any mental health challenges we may be experiencing. The unfortunate reality is many people still hold on to negative stigmas related to mental health. It is especially hard for someone to seek help for themselves because of stigma, finances, or transportation issues. We should all have the same concern and understanding for someone who is experiencing a mental health challenge as we do for someone who is experiencing a physical illness. The truth is one in five adults in the US experience some type of mental health challenge during their life. As Catholics we can all play a role in reducing the stigma around mental health and learn ways we can both take care of our own mental health but also to support others on their journey as well.

Because mental illness is so stigmatizing, often people feel they're going through things alone. Showing them that there are those who accept them for who they are and what they're going through, and love them for who they are is the ultimate spiritual gift we can bring. One of the most healing things we can do as people of faith is to listen to others, hear what they're going through, and meet

their spiritual needs. This was the same message expressed by Pope Francis over his many years of ministry, we are called to accompany others, to love, and to walk side by side with our neighbor.

Our mental health is intrinsically connected to our spiritual health, and should not be something we ignore. I encourage you to examine your own mental health this week, what do you do to maintain your mental health? How would you respond or accompany someone with a mental illness? For some this may be a challenging exercise or perhaps you simply feel lost. For this reason St. Patrick is proud to offer a variety of resources from grief support and mental health first aid training, to support groups and Catholic Charities counseling, there are a number of resources available. The important thing to know is you are not alone. No matter what you are going through, you are valuable to God and to others. God wants you to live a happy and fruitful life, there is hope. # CREATE A SIMPLE PRAYER SPACE TOGETHER

Setting up a small sacred space in your home with your grandchildren can be a great way to mark a space for prayer when they visit. First, find a small spot on a table or nook and use a cloth to anchor the space. Add a Bible, cross or crucifix, sacred images, and any other faith statues or mementos that you have. As you place these in the space, share stories about your different items. Have your grandchildren fill a vase with water and cut some flowers to fill it. Our Mother Mary loves to be surrounded by flowers. You may also want to add a candle. When your grandchildren visit, use this spot to say a short prayer or give a blessing. Let them help you take care of the space; this may encourage them to create a space in their own room at home as well.

## Recipe:

## Mini Apple Pie Bites!

- -1/2 cup sugar
- -2 tsp. ground cinnamon
- -2 sheets refrigerated pie crust
- -3 tbsp. butter (melted and divided)
- -2 medium tart apples
- -Caramel sauce (optional)

Preheat oven to 425°. In a small bowl, mix sugar and cinnamon. On a lightly floured surface, unroll pie crusts. Roll and trim each to an 8 inch square. Brush with 2 tablespoons of butter and sprinkle with half of the sugar mixture. Cut each square into eight 1 inch strips. Cut each apple into 8 wedges and wrap one strip of pastry around each wedge, placing sugared side of pastry against the apple. Place on a parchment-lined baking sheet. Brush tops with remaining butter and sprinkle with remaining sugar mixture. Bake for 13-15 minutes or until pastry is golden brown. Serve warm with caramel sauce!

# HOW TO REDUCE STRESS IN 5 STEPS



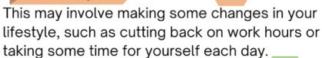
#### Identify your stressors:

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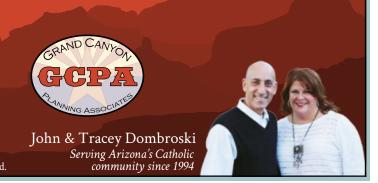
